I was about to skate my short program and had one of the worst five-minute warmups ever and I could see my coaches were a bit antsy. When it came time to perform, I did a great program and honestly surprised myself and my coaches. I haven't had a performance as satisfying as that one in a long time.

ECHO: My favorite team highlight was when my duet partner and I won parade of duet champions at national showcase. We had so much fun with that performance.


